Recipe for SANDWICH CAKE - class 55

Take fat, sugar and self-raising flour to the weight of three eggs.
Mix and then beat together well
Bake in two sandwich tins and put together with a jam filling.

Recipe for EASY FRUIT CAKE - class 56

12ozs mixed fruit
4ozs granulated sugar
4ozs margarine
A quarter of a pint of water.
1 beaten egg
8ozs self-raising flour

1. Place fruit, sugar, margarine and water in to a saucepan and simmer slowly for 20 minutes. Leave to cool.
2. Add beaten egg and stir in flour.
3. Turn in to a greased 6-7 inch round cake tin and bake in a moderate oven 300-325°F, 140-150°C or Gas Mark 2-3, for 1 to 1 1/2 hours

Recipe for DATE AND WALNUT LOAF - class 58

8 oz dates
2 oz walnuts
3 oz brown sugar
4 oz margarine
A quarter pint of water
1 egg
8 oz self-raising flour

1. Simmer dates, nuts, margarine, sugar and water slowly in a pan with a lid for 20 minutes. Allow to cool.
2. Add beaten egg and stir in the flour.
3. Bake in a loaf tin for 1½ hours at 300 degrees Fahrenheit, 150 degrees Celsius.

In classes 45 - 49, material used need not have been grown by the exhibitor but in ALL OTHER classes exhibits must have been grown, made or otherwise produced by the exhibitor unless expressly stated otherwise. Plants must have been bought at least a month before exhibiting if not grown from own seed or cutting.**
- 2. Exhibits may be staged on Friday 11th August between 7.00pm and 8.00pm and on Saturday 12th August between 9.00am and 11.00am. The hall will then be cleared for judging.**
- 3. No Gardening Club Member may win the Gardening Club Trophy in any 2 consecutive years**
- 4. A competitor may enter more than one exhibit in any class but may only take one prize in any one class.**
- 5. In the cut flower classes 33-43 decorative foliage will be allowed.**
- 6. Prize money will be paid between 4.15pm and 5.15pm on Show Day. Any prize money not claimed will be deemed as donated equally to the Village Hall and Garden Club funds.**
- 7. Exhibits may not be removed from the hall until after the presentation of the cups.**
- 8. Any disputes or complaints relating to judging or any other question should be referred to the Show Secretary by 4pm on Show Day. The Committee will rule on any such dispute or complaint and its decision is final.**
- 9. The Committee, whilst taking every reasonable precaution, cannot be held responsible for any exhibit, vase or container being damaged or lost.**
